## Helping those who need it most!

DITR always has a soft spot for those animals that are sick or in need of a little extra care. Recently DITR has seen the need for homes for puppies and dogs suffering from mange. Mange is a skin disease caused by tiny mites. commonly found in companion canines. Some are normal while others are not. An exact cause of mange is unknown. The symptoms of mange depend on which type of mite is present.

Sarcoptic mange is transferred easily between hosts. It can result in restlessness and frantic scratching, symptoms which generally appear one week after exposure. It also can result in hair loss, reddened skin, body sores and scabs. The most commonly affected areas are a dog's ears, elbows, face and legs, but it can rapidly spread to the entire body. When passed to humans, sarcoptic mange causes a rash of red bumps, similar to mosquito bites.

All dogs raised normally by their mothers have demodectic mange mites, which are transferred from mother to pup via cuddling. Most dogs never suffer any consequences. There are three types of demodectic mange that affect canines; it cannot be transmitted to

humans or to cats. Localized cases result in isolated scaly bald patches creating a polkadot appearance. Generalized demodectic mange, in contrast, affects larger areas of skin or a dog's entire body. Demodectic pododermatitis is confined to the foot and accompanied by bacterial infections.

Depending on the type of mange and the breed of your dog, medication may be given orally or applied topically, by injection, or via shampoo and dip. For sarcoptic mange, the first step in the treatment is isolating your dog to prevent the spread. All bedding, collars and fabric-based toys should be thoroughly cleaned, but preferably replaced. For treating demodectic mange, medications and managing physiological stress are essential. Some infected dogs may also require special treatment - such as medicated shampoos - for secondary skin infections.

Please note, many skin treatments can be toxic to dogs and should not be repeated frequently, so please check with your vet before beginning any treatment program for mange.




# **Volunteer Spotlight:**
